

## **2.411 CONCURRENT JURISDICTION- Maryland-National Capital Park & Planning Commission (M-NCPPC, or “PG Park”)**

### **2.411.10 Authority**

- A. The agency (UMPD) and the Maryland-National Capital Park & Planning Commission (M-NCPPC, or “PG Park”) have entered into an agreement pursuant to the Maryland Annotated Code Section 17-301, and the Education Article ED 13-601(b)(2)(ii) for the coordination of enforcement responsibilities within the area of concurrent jurisdiction that is adjoining property owned or operated by the University of Maryland, College Park within the primary jurisdiction of M-NCPPC.
- B. A copy of this Mutual Aid Agreement between the M-NCPPC, and the University of Maryland, on behalf of the University of Maryland Police Department accompanies this directive.
  - 1. The attached copy of the agreement is for informational purposes only and is not suitable for introduction as evidence in court for administrative cases
  - 2. Certified true test copies of the agreement may be checked out from the Records Unit for introduction as evidence in court or administrative cases.

### **2.411.20 Limitation of Concurrent Jurisdictional Agreement/Mutual Aid**

- A. UMPD Officers will not routinely patrol in the primary jurisdiction of M-NCPPC except to the extent required to patrol University Properties located within, or as is reasonable in scope and duration under the circumstances.
- B. The concurrent/ mutual aid agreement places limitations on the authority of officers of this agency when responding to specified incidents.
  - 1. In certain incidents, officers from this agency may not exercise police powers unless an apprehension can be made as the result of fresh pursuit, incident to fresh pursuit, or on the scene of the offense. These incidents are:
    - a. Part I offenses established by FBI Uniform Crime Report (UCR) definitions, as follows:
      - 1. Criminal homicide;
      - 2. Forcible rape;
      - 3. Robbery
      - 4. Aggravated assault;
      - 5. Burglary;
      - 6. Theft (excepting motor vehicle theft);
      - 7. Motor vehicle theft; and
      - 8. Arson.
    - b. All deaths, including those occurring as the result of motor vehicle accidents;
    - c. All cases of suspected child abuse; and
    - d. Crimes occurring on Prince George’s County school property.
  - 2. UMPD Officers may enforce all applicable laws in M-NCPPC primary jurisdiction and exercise full and complete police powers:
    - a. In response to requests for backup or assistance by M-NCPPC;

- b. In an emergency; or
    - c. When directed by M-NCPPC.
  - 2. UMPD Officers may also enforce all applicable laws in M-NCPPC primary jurisdiction and exercise full and complete police powers:
    - a. To investigate suspicious activity or threats to the safety of persons or property;
    - b. When engaged in fresh pursuit or in matters incident to fresh pursuit when:
      - 1. A person has committed or is reasonably believed to have committed a felony, or has committed a misdemeanor in the presence of an officer; and
      - 2. The offense that gave rise to the fresh pursuit occurred in primary or concurrent jurisdiction.

### **2.411.30 Operational Details**

- A. When calls for service within the area of concurrent jurisdiction are received by this agency, agency personnel will immediately transfer calls to M-NCPPC after informing callers that the reason for the transfer is that M-NCPPC is the agency of primary jurisdiction.
- B. Requests for assistance may be referred by M-NCPPC to this agency, providing officers from this agency are available to handle the request for service in the area of concurrent jurisdiction.
- C. Should officers from this agency be unable to respond, M-NCPPC will be responsible for responding to the requests for assistance as the agency with primary jurisdiction.
- D. When calls for service within the area of concurrent jurisdiction are received by M-NCPPC and subsequently referred to this agency, agency personnel will gather sufficient information so that the officers from this agency may respond as the agency with concurrent jurisdiction. However, should UMPD officers be unable to respond, M-NCPPC will be responsible for responding to the requests for assistance as the agency with primary jurisdiction.
- E. CCNs will be generated for all calls for service received by this agency in the area of concurrent jurisdiction, whether the calls are initiated by citizens, officers from this agency, or referred to this agency by M-NCPPC.
- F. In the event that UMPD Officers are first on scene of an incident occurring in M-NCPPC primary jurisdiction, the M-NCPPC must be notified immediately with the request for M-NCPPC to come to the scene.
- G. The UMPD Officer(s) shall assume command and control of the area, maintain the integrity of the scene, establish a perimeter, and begin to gather victim and/ or witness information until a M-NCPPC officer arrives, at which time UMPD will relinquish the scene to the responsibility to M-NCPPC, unless fresh pursuit of a crime that occurred on University Property led to property within M-NCPPC primary jurisdiction, or unless expressly waived by the M-NCPPC.
- H. All reports taken in the area of concurrent jurisdiction by officers from this agency will contain a M-NCPPC case number.
- I. Records Unit personnel will furnish, on a timely basis, cop-

ies of all reports of arrests and/ or incidents to which the agency responds to or take action, based on the agreement, in the area of concurrent jurisdiction.
